The Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department provides the highest quality services to protect the lives, property, and environment of our community.

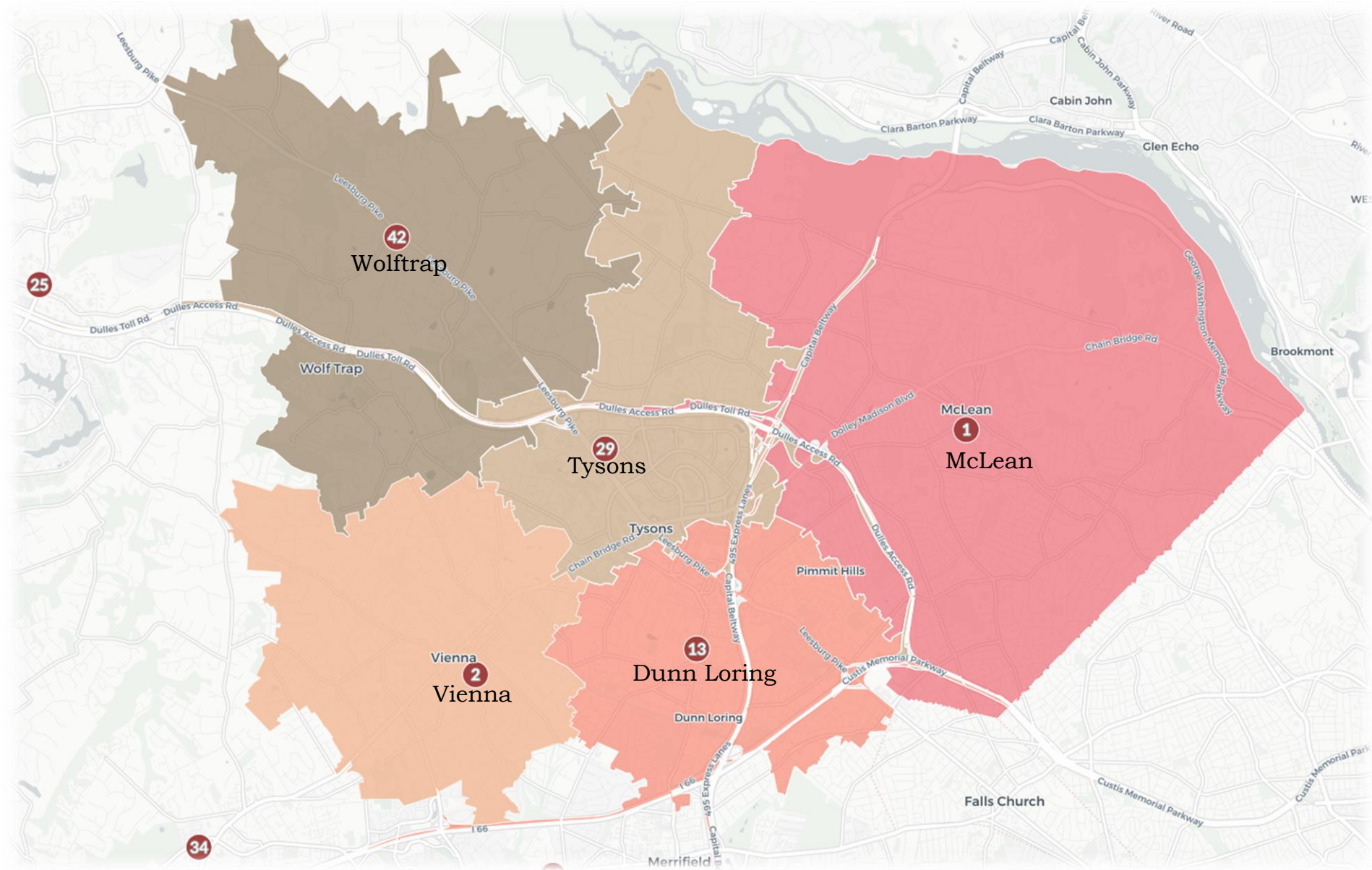

Primary Response Stations

Metrics	Countywide	Greater Tysons Area *
AED Response Rate within 5 minutes	55.8%	46.9%
Average Time	5 minutes	5.5 minutes
Engine Company within 5:20	48.8%	48.5%
Average Time	5.95 minutes	5.98 minutes

Fire and Rescue Planning Process

- Conduct annual data analysis
- Analyze historical rate of incidents
- Review rezoning development applications
- Determines additional fire stations and response units
- Incorporate into the capital improvement plan and budget



Future Fire Stations for Tysons Area

- Two fire stations negotiated through developer proffers
- Scotts Run Fire Station 44
 - Planned completion date: December 31, 2020
- New Tysons Fire Station 29
 - Timing for new fire station to be determined

- Minimum staff
6-10 per 24 hour shift

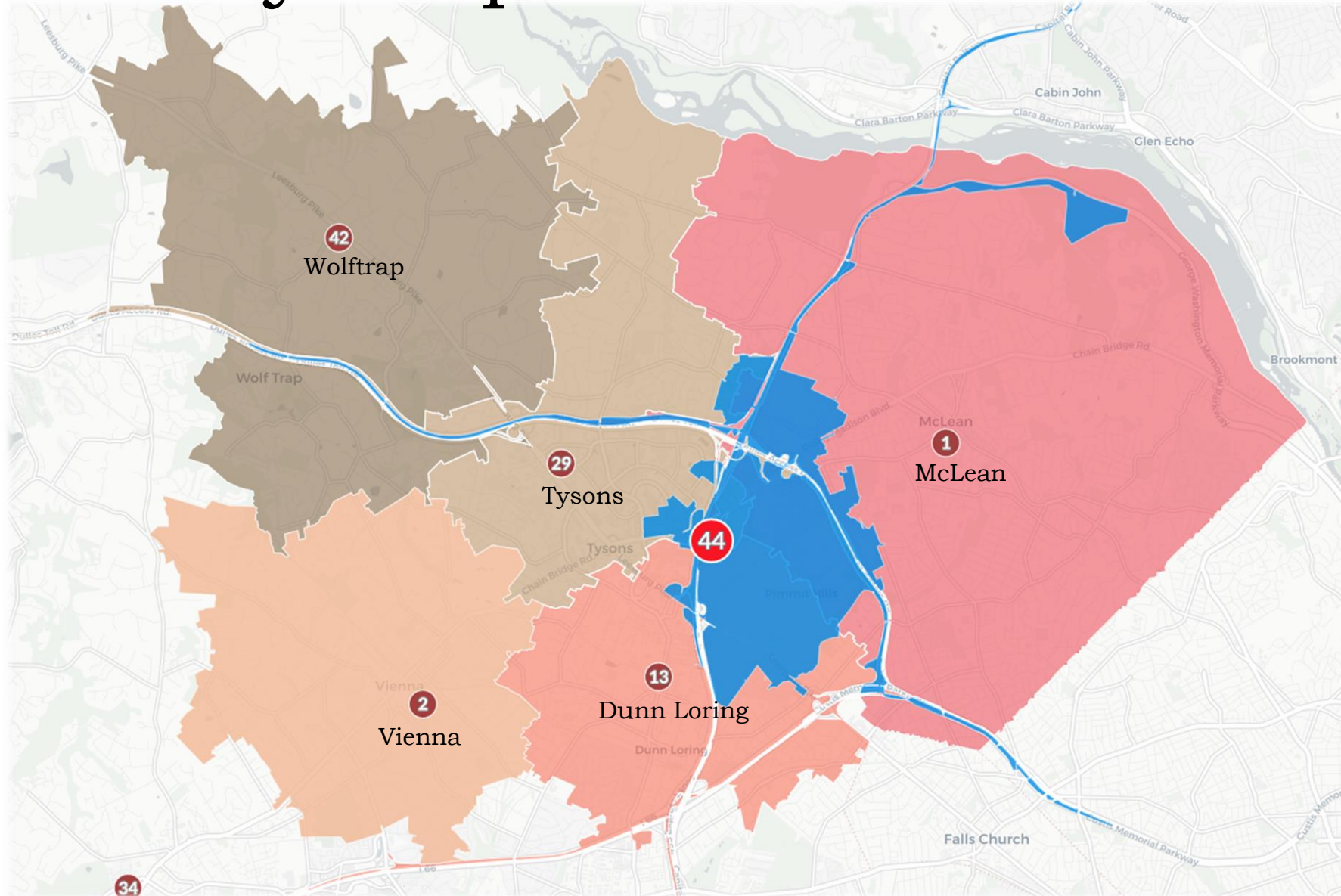

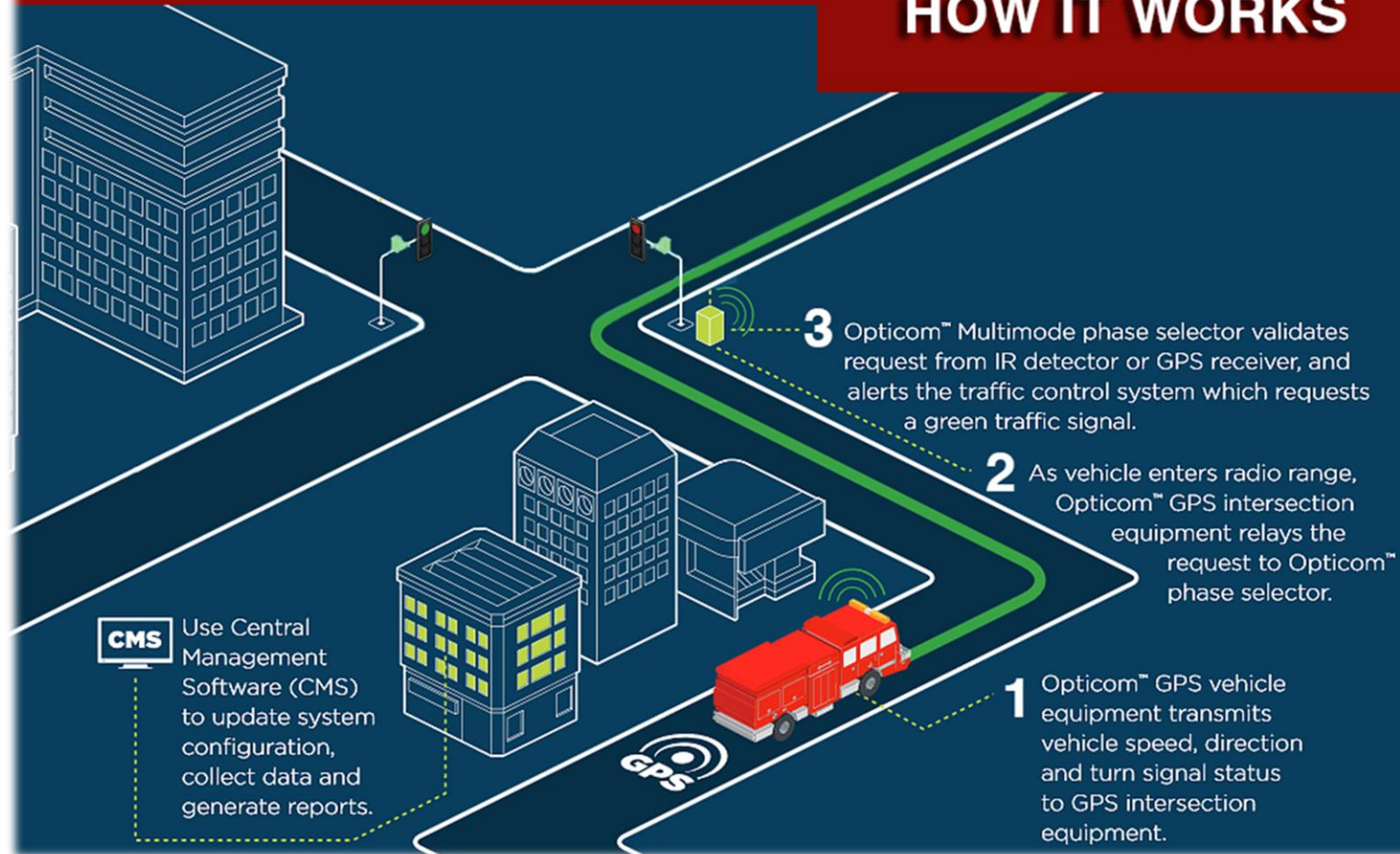
Primary Response with Station 44
