Mission

 The purpose of the Fairfax County Citizen Corps Council is to harness the power of every individual through education, training, and volunteer service to make communities safer, stronger, and better prepared to respond to threats of terrorism, crime, public health issues, and disasters of all kinds.



History

- Following the events of September 11, 2001, state and local government officials have increased opportunities for residents to become an integral part of protecting communities and supporting first responders.
- In January 2002, the President of the United States launched Citizen Corps, to capture that spirit of service.
- The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors formed the local Citizen Corps Council in January of 2003 to bring the energy to Fairfax County.



Who We Are

- The Fairfax County Citizen Corps Council is a group of emergency-related volunteer organizations that meet regularly to coordinate and collaborate in emergency preparedness efforts in Fairfax County.
- In addition, each member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors appoints a representative to attend Council meetings on behalf of that district.
- Fairfax County Citizen Corps Council meetings include members of the local government, community partners, and citizens concerned with emergency preparedness.



What We Do

- The Fairfax County Citizen Corps Council promotes disaster preparedness and community resiliency by building partnerships and offering opportunities for collaboration.
- During times of an emergency, Citizen Corps Council members and their volunteers may be called to serve by fulfilling the designated roles of their individual programs.
- The Fairfax County Department of Emergency Management and Security (DEMS) coordinates county planning, response, support, and recovery efforts before, during, and after large-scale events and emergencies.



Building Resiliency

 Council member organizations have done much to build resiliency in Fairfax County, and have been active during recent Fairfax County emergencies and events such as:

Community Outreach

- The council educates the general public on how to prepare for emergencies and promotes volunteerism to further prepare the community.
- The council participates in community events and seeks outreach opportunities.
- The council typically patriciates in the Burke Festival and presents their signature event: *Ready, Set, Know*

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)

A program training volunteers to make communities safer, more prepared, and when incidents occur, more resilient in recovery.

Mission Essential Function: Emergency Operations Center (EOC)








Community Emergency Response Guide (CERG)

Storm Stages & Categories From Storm to Hurricane






